




The First to Settle in Chesterfield




► The village of Chesterfield was formerly called Recklesstown, it was named in honor of <u>Joseph Reckless</u>, who was an early settler and ran a mill. Anthony Bullock who served in the US congress during the 1800's changed the name to Chesterfield.

There is a story told by Thomas Ridgeway that relates to how the name was changed: Anthony Bullock had many friends in Washington. One day he was approached by one of them who said, "Why don't you change the name of that town of yours? That reckless part of it sounds ridiculous."


The Chesterfield Inn, originally named The Recklesstown Tavern

Built in 1710, THE CHESTERFIELD INN was originally named the Recklestown Tavern since Chesterfield was originally called Recklestown! Listed in the National Registry of Historic Buildings in Washington, this quaint edifice was a stage coach stop and community gathering place.

In early times The Chesterfield Inn was a <u>Stage Coach Stop</u> and a community gathering place. There is a door, below the green arrow which is hard to see. Notice how high the door is from the ground! Why do you suppose it is so high?

A Chesterfield Tradition

One of the unusual features of Chesterfield is the Buttonwood Tree that stands in the middle of the roadway, halfway between the General Store and The Chesterfield Inn. The original tree was there for more than half a century. It became diseased and had to be removed. During 1998 the old stump was removed and a new Buttonwood tree was planted. A Chesterfield tradition is to decorate the tree the night before Halloween! How many of you have seen it when decorated?








Chesterfield School Through Time








Some of the First to Settle Here Were Farmers and Merchants


Farmers plowed their fields with the help of the improved plow and horses





Charles Newbold was an American Blacksmith born in 1780 in Chesterfield Township, New Jersey. On June 26, 1797, Newbold received the first patent for a castiron plow. However, he was unable to sell his plow because many farmers feared that the iron in it would poison the soil. Later the plow was accepted by farmers and became a helpful invention. We still have a road in Chesterfield named after the Newbold family, it is called Newbold Lane.











them to enter the company grounds.



The Combine Strips the Kernels From the Corn Cob




Then the kernels pass through the tall shoot on the combine into the back of a large truck. The grain is then transported to the market, a mill, or to a silo.

The Village of Sykesville



Honorable George Sykes 1802-1880

George Sykes of English decent, was born near Sykesville (formerly Plattsburg). When he was 15 he taught school in Mount Pleasant School House, and later in Juliustown and Sykesville, NJ.

In his early life, he was a surveyor and conveyer, then later he began drawing deeds and leases for transferring property, he continued this profession most of his life. It is said that George Sykes had a great memory of the early settlement and of the old families of Burlington County. He represented his district in Congress from 1844-1846. He was a member of the House of Assembly of NJ in 1877, 1878, and 1879. He never solicited any person for their vote nor asked anyone to pay for his services.










The Village of Crosswicks




Crosswicks

This community was first settled by Quakers after 1677 when Thomas Foulkes purchased 320 acres on the south side of Crosswicks Creek. Crosswicks is still a village out of the past with only six streets, Front, Church, Main, New, Buttonwood and Ward Avenue.



Crosswicks Quaker Meeting Religious Society of Friends

Quakers settled Crosswicks in 1677 and purchased this land toward the end of that century. Friends have worshiped on this site continuously since that time. The smaller building was erected in the mid 1780's for use as a Quaker school and is now used as a First Day (Sunday) school and gathering place.

During the Revolutionary War, the meetinghouse was occupied at various times by both Colonial and British forces, though meetings for worship were still held. Use as a wartime barracks was a challenge to the Quakers, as it was in such contradiction to our peace testimony.

The meetinghouse is in the National Register of Historic Places. With its cedar interior and hand wrought nails, it was built in 1773 at a cost of £750 (\$3750).

It is the third meetinghouse built on the property, the first having been built of log construction in 1693.

Friends hold, as the basis of our faith, the belief that God endows every human being with a measure of Divine Spirit which may be experienced directly. This is often called the Light Within.

Our manner of worship is an outgrowth of this belief. We gather in quiet assembly, mindful of the words, "Be still, and know that I am God." We wait in anticipation of the Spirit of God which may move one or more worshippers to give vocal ministry.

Quakers today continue to live a witness of simplicity and social consciousness, working for peace and justice among nations and within families.

The Crosswicks Oak

*A land mark to the village was a great oak tree that was located beside the Meeting House. It was struck by lighting on July 21, 1975. During the night of August 14, 1975 the giant oak tree finally split and fell with a THUNDEROUS crash, awakening most of the people living close by. This land mark oak tree, pictured below, was entered into the Hall of Fame for big trees, in Washington, D.C. March 21,1921.

In 1964 the oak's circumference was 19 feet, 2 inches, 100 feet in height, 148 feet spread and 73 inches diameter. A good idea for math class:






The Old Tavern in Crosswicks has served travelers since 1681!

It was later called the Upper Crust Pub, and it still serves the public as Osteria Procaccini







Across the street from the Old Inn there once stood the Brick's Mince Meat Factory and the Village Blacksmith Shop. You can see them in the next slides.





This Building had to be demolished in 2020. It stood across from Osteria. Originally it was the Brick's Mince Meat Factory, which was one of the earliest and most successful businesses in Crosswicks. Mince Meat was manufactured here from 1874-1968, Brick's became the largest manufacturer of Mince Meat in the US. The Brick family is an important family in the History of Chesterfield. Among other things they are responsible for creating the Chesterfield Twp. Historical Society. Several descendants still live in Crosswicks.



The "Trenton" Adjustable Combination Desk.

The "Trenton" Adjustable Combination Desk, with Lifting Lid.

With the exception of the Lifting Lid and closed box, this Desk is the same as shown above. Instead of ordinary cabinet hinges, malleable iron friction hinges are used, and are centered from under the lid, showing no hinges on the face of the desk, and holding the lid in any position that it may be left, thus avoiding a slam. The usual glued cleats of lifting lids are done away with. The arm of the hinge serves as a dovetail to the lid, which allows the full expansion and contraction of the lid without splitting or breaking a glue joint as with lids cleated.

Automatic Adjustment, Effecting Horizontal and Vertical Movements.

The Seat and Deak adjust independently. When the seat in front is lowered it approaches the Deak and is nearer, as required for smaller pupils. The height of the Seat can be adjusted so that the pupils' feet will rest squarely on the floor with the limb joints at right angles, and there is perfect circulation. Imagine a grown person with his feet dangling from a high seat for hours at a time; simple restlessness would not describe it. If it is torture to the grown, must it not also be so to the young? The adjustment is automatic and extremely simple, being made at either end of the Deak, not necessarily both ends.

The "Trenton" Adjustable Combination Desk was first placed on the market in the summer of 1896, and since that time more of this style of Desk have been sold than any other. In every point it has proven the most successful adjustable combination Desk ever






Many safe houses had secret hiding places for enslaved people seeking freedom. Notice on the left it just looks like a storage cabinet. On the right you see the secret opening to

The Quakers Were Devoted to Abolishing Slavery

- ▶ Early in history it was common for families to have enslaved people to help with daily work. Records have been found naming some of the enslaved owned by members of the Crosswicks Friends Meeting. But in 1776 the Quakers became some of the most devoted to abolishing slavery.
- ► There was a petition submitted by Crosswicks Quakers to the NJ State Legislature in 1775 in support of abolishing slavery. It is the first anti-slavery petition ever submitted to the state legislature.
- ► The Chesterfield Historical Society will be exhibiting a copy of the petition in a future museum exhibit.
