What is Fiction?

Fiction is defined as writing that is made up such as novels and short stories.

Most fiction has several elements that hold the story together.

Characters

Most stories that are fiction have a main character who is the focus of the action as well as several minor characters who receive less attention but help move the story along. The characters can be human or animals.

Central theme

The theme is the main idea of the story. A theme can be based on many things such as discovery, ambition, love, adventure, suspense, fear, or curiosity.

Conflict

Conflict is the main obstacle or problem the main character must overcome in the story. There are several types of conflict.

- person vs. nature
- person vs. self
- person vs. person
- person vs. society

Plot

The *plot* is the series of events that the main character experiences as he or she solves a dilemma. The plot starts with a triggering action and continues with a logical series of events to tell the story.

Setting

The setting of a story is the place and/or time in which the action of the story takes place.

Dialogue

Dialogue is the conversation that takes place among the characters in a story. The dialogue helps to move the plot along.

Narrator

The *narrator* is the voice telling the story. The narrator can be the author or a character in the story.
